## General Information

### Location:

All conference events except the banquet will take place at the Fairmont Hotel in downtown Dallas, at 1717 North Akard Street. The banquet will be held at the Southfork Ranch, near Dallas (buses will be provided for conference attendees).

### Registration:

The registration desk will be open from 6 – 9 pm on Saturday, from 8 am – 5 pm Sunday and Monday, and from 8 am – 2:30 pm Tuesday.

### Registration Fee:

The non-student registration fee includes the Saturday night reception, the Sunday night business meeting, the Monday night banquet, coffee breaks, lunches, and a copy of the proceedings. The student fee includes all of the above except the banquet.

### Proceedings:

Prepaid additional copies of the STOC '98 proceedings can be ordered with the registration form and will be available for pick-up at registration. There will also be copies available at the registration desk on a first come, first served basis, while supplies last, for \$54 per copy.

### Hotel Information:

Our block of rooms at the Fairmont Hotel is being held from May 21 until May 29. We encourage you to make your reservations by telephone.

The conference hotel will be the Fairmont Hotel, which is located in the Dallas Arts District. The hotel has a similar ambiance to the renowned Fairmont in San Francisco on Nob Hill. It is a Mobil Four-Star and a AAA Four-Diamond hotel with 24 hour dining. The Pyramid Room has been a consistent recipient of the Travel/Holiday Award for Dining Excellence.

**Banquet:**

For an authentically fake Dallas experience, the banquet will be held at the Southfork Ranch, the location where the television series “Dallas” was filmed in the 80’s. This ranch was bought by an investor recently who has turned the place into a convention facility. We will provide Kosher and Vegetarian meals for those who request them on their conference registration form.

Buses will be provided to and from the ranch. Buses leave the hotel at 6 P.M.

**Official Airlines:**

Continental Airlines is the official airline for STOC 98. We have negotiated substantial reduced fares (zone fares and/or discounted fares) for flights to and from the conference. Call 1-800-468-7022 and mention the locator NNGPZL.

**Getting to the Hotel:**

Conference attendees traveling by air may arrive at either the Dallas-Fort Worth airport (DFW) or Dallas Love Field, although restrictions placed on flights to and from Love Field make travel there difficult unless you are coming from Texas or a neighboring state.

The “SuperShuttle” provides transportation between either airport and the Fairmont Hotel. From DFW airport, after collecting your baggage use the ground transportation board courtesy phone to make arrangements, and a shuttle will then meet you at the Shared Ride Zone on the lower level. The fare from DFW is \$11 per passenger. From Love Field, advance scheduled pick-up is available by calling (817) 329-2000; the fare from Love Field is \$9 per passenger. If you prefer to take a taxi, the fare from DFW airport to the hotel is approximately \$33, and the fare from Love Field is approximately \$10.

To get back to the airport from the hotel using the SuperShuttle, advanced reservations are required. More information can be obtained from the hotel.

If you are driving your own car or renting a car at the airport, you can reach the hotel using the following directions.

If you are driving in *from the north or the south*, take Interstate 35E toward Dallas. Exit on Highway 45/75 to Houston/Sherman, and take the first exit to Griffin Street. Merge left onto Griffin and continue straight to the first stop light, which is Ross Avenue. Turn left on

Ross and go two blocks to Akard Street. Take a left on Akard and the Fairmont will be on your immediate left.

If you are coming *from DFW airport*, take the South exit from the airport and follow road signs to Dallas. This will take you on Highway 183 East to Interstate 35E, which you should take south. From that point you can follow the driving directions given above.

If you are coming *from Love Field*, go West (right) on Mockingbird Lane after leaving the airport. Mockingbird will take you to I-35E, which you should take south and pick up the driving directions given above.

If you are driving in *from the west*, take eastbound Interstate 30 and exit to your left on Downtown Business District — 35E North. From that point go to the Highway 45/75 exit, and follow the directions for driving in from the south.

If you are driving in *from the east*, take westbound Interstate 30 to the Ervay Street exit which you take from the left-hand lane of I-30. Take a right on Ervay and continue approximately 14 blocks to Ross Avenue. Cross Ross Avenue and the hotel is on your immediate left.

At the hotel, parking is available for \$15 per day (short stays may be charged less on an hourly basis). The garage is monitored by security cameras on a 24-hour basis.

**Child Care:**

Child care can be arranged by the concierge at the hotel.

**Climate:**

In May, the average high temperature is 82 degrees Fahrenheit (27°C) and the average low temperature is 63 degrees Fahrenheit (17°C). These Spring-time days can be very nice; however, in Texas we have an expression: “If you don’t like the weather, wait an hour.” The weather can and does change very quickly here, so you might want to check a forecast before going outside for long periods of time.

**Things to Do:**

The Fairmont Hotel is in the Arts District of Dallas, and is within a short distance of several interesting areas. Dallas is home to over 160 museums, galleries, and artistic attractions, many within a short distance of the conference hotel. Restaurants are also in abundance: Dallas has more restaurants per capita than New York City (over 6,000 in all!), and includes the only AAA 5-diamond restaurants in all of Texas (*The French Room* and *The Mansion on Turtle Creek*).

One block east from the hotel (on Ross Avenue and St. Paul Street) you will find the *Dallas Museum of Art*, which houses one of the best pre-Columbian art exhibits in the country. A couple of blocks further east (and

one block north) will bring you to the *Morton H. Myerson Symphony Center*, an impressive building designed by noted architect I.M. Pei and begun with a \$17 million donation from Ross Perot. Fans of architecture may want to check out *Dallas City Hall* (1500 Marilla St.), also designed by I.M. Pei.

About four blocks to the west of the hotel you encounter the *West End Historic District*, a rather touristy area with over 80 shops and 55 restaurants, including largely Texas and Louisiana style food, as well as a brewpub and a Planet Hollywood. On weekends the West End is a festive area with street mimes, horse and buggy rides, and live entertainment. Also in the West End you will find *Dallas Alley*, an area with nine nightclubs that can all be visited for one shared cover charge.

A little bit past the West End, you can visit sites dedicated to the most infamous event in Dallas history — the assassination of John F. Kennedy. Dealey plaza (where the assassination occurred) and the John F. Kennedy Memorial Plaza are both near the west end of Main Street. The *Sixth Floor Museum* (411 Elm St.) is a permanent educational museum which examines the life, death, and legacy of John F. Kennedy. It is housed in the former Texas School Book Depository, which is where Lee Harvey Oswald was perched to shoot Kennedy. Or maybe not. If you want to explore other possibilities, you can check out the *Conspiracy Museum* (110 S. Market Street) to learn about the “other side of the JFK assassination,” as well as conspiracy theories about the assassinations of Presidents Lincoln and Garfield, Martin Luther King, Jr., and Robert Kennedy. For a more morbid approach, you can take a drive along Kennedy’s exact route in a replica of the limosine he was shot in, complete with “realistic sound effects.”

For a more alternative area, you can head southeast from the hotel (about 10 blocks) to the area known as *Deep Ellum*, around Elm Street and Central Ave. This eclectic area is home to many night clubs, tattoo parlors, unique shops, and good restaurants. Near that area, you might also want to check out the *Majestic Theater*, a restored 1920’s vaudeville and movie palace that is now home to local performing arts and touring shows.

For an area with still another feel to it, visit the *McKinney Avenue area* by taking the *McKinney Avenue Trolley* from St. Paul Street, next to the Dallas Museum of Art. The Trolley is the largest volunteer-run system in the world. McKinney Avenue is an upscale area and is home to many fine restaurants, galleries, and shops, as well as some touristy places like the Hard Rock Cafe.

To get to some locations farther from the hotel, the *DART Light Rail* is a commuter rail system that is the newest and most modern in the U.S. You can catch

this system a couple of blocks from the hotel at the Akard Station (on Pacific Ave. between Akard and Field Street). You can travel within the Central Business District for 50 cents, or outside this area for one dollar. Going north, you can travel to the *SMU area* (go to the Mockingbird Station). Going south, you can travel to the *Dallas Zoo*, which is home to over 1,500 animals, including the 25-acre “Wilds of Africa” exhibit.

Requiring a short car or a taxi ride, the *lower Greenville Avenue area* is an interesting blend of restaurants and entertainment. The restaurants are good and (for the most part) reasonably priced, and you can find good American, Mexican, Thai, French, and other types of food here.

A short ride to the east of the hotel takes you to *Fair Park*, which has 8 museums (including “Science Place”) and an IMAX theater.

The *Dallas Arboretum and Botanical Gardens* (8525 Garland Rd.) is a slightly longer drive to the east, and consists of 66 acres, including the largest public collections of azalea in the country.

If you have access to a car, you could consider visiting neighboring *Fort Worth*. While only a fraction of the size of Dallas, Fort Worth offers some attractions which rival or exceed their counterparts in Dallas. The *Kimbell Art Museum* (3333 Camp Bowie Blvd) is a small museum, but attracts some of the top traveling exhibits in the world. Other museums in the same general vicinity of Fort Worth include the Amon Carter Museum, the Modern Art Museum, and the Museum of Science and History. Near the museums is the Fort Worth Botanical Gardens, a wonderful place to spend a nice spring day. A short distance from these attractions is the *Fort Worth Zoo* (1989 Colonial Parkway) — beautifully managed, it is rated as one of the top five zoos in the country.
